2016 was a very productive year for the Department of Motor Vehicles. Several activities highlighted our agency efforts to serve our customers more efficiently and provide services which are more accessible to the residents of Nebraska. Below are some projects reflecting those efforts.

In January, the Department of Motor Vehicles was chosen as the pilot agency for the State of Nebraska's efforts for process improvement. We examined the way we process accident reports and share the information with insurance companies to determine if drivers are properly insured. The result of those efforts was a reduction from 15 days to 1.5 days in processing time.

Work continued throughout the year on the modernization project for our Vehicle, Title, and Registration System. Extensive communication with project stakeholders was completed, vendor information gathered and the framework for a request for proposal was created.

Additional online services were launched increasing the convenience of services for our customers. In May, the driver license re-examination report was made available to law enforcement officers online. On June 28th an application became available which allows individuals to change the address on their driver license or state identification card online. In July, a new enhancement was deployed allowing driver training schools to electronically submit the roster of class attendees; which is then automatically posted to the individual's driving record.

The department continues to leverage technology to better serve our customers. In September, new electronic skills testing tablets were deployed allowing for automated test results, more accurate and consistent test results, and better auditing capabilities. In October, Nebraska joined eight other states participating in state to state verification of driver and identification documents enhancing our efforts to decrease fraud and identity theft.

The past year has been outstanding not only for our business achievements, but also for the additional efforts our employees put forth to make Nebraska a leader in national forums, and also the extra effort they put forth to make our communities a better place to work and live.

July 1, 1996 marked day one of the division and merged employees from DMV, Roads, Revenue and the Public Service Commission to create a commercial vehicle "**one-stop shop**".

The DMV ensures that licensed drivers meet the eligibility requirements for operating a motor vehicle and those vehicles are properly titled An additional purpose is to and registered. generate and collect revenues that support not only the services offered by DMV but also government entities. The DMV is composed of seven divisions. We are a support services office for the Department of Motor Vehicles. The division includes the director, deputy director, accounting and finance manager, human resources manager, project manager Functions staff. in and support the Administration Division provide overall assistance to the operations of all divisions within the Department of Motor Vehicles. The director also serves as the chairperson of the Motor Vehicle Industry Licensing board.

LEGAL DIVISION

Summary

The Legal Division performs and manages legal work for the Department to support the work of the agency's other divisions. Major focuses includes preparation and support of agency legislation, preparation, review, and renewal of contracts, preparation and review of various legal documents, review of federal laws and regulations to comply with federal mandates, and to conduct administrative appeals for the agency. The Legal Division also handles applications for persons applying to the Board of Pardons for reprieve of fifteen year license revocations, manages certification of Safety Training Option Programs (STOP), certifies ignition interlock providers, and provides manufacturers' warranty information to the public. The Legal Division administers the Administrative License Revocation (ALR) program to remove the driver's licenses of persons arrested for drunk driving in Nebraska.

Goals

• Administer the ALR program in compliance with statue and case law.

• Promulgate rules and regulations for the DMV in compliance with the Administrative Procedure Act with input from stakeholders and department managers.

- Prepare and review contracts and other legal documents.
- Manage administrative hearings and appeals.

Accomplishments

• ALR Program affirmed the administrative revocation of 6,022 drivers.

• Held two public hearings for rule & regulation revisions: third party tester & ignition interlock rules.

44 applications for fifteen-year reprieves were processed. 23 applicants were granted reprieves, 18 denied, 2 applicants granted commutations and one reprieve rescinded.

• Coordinates various claims and prepares response submitted to the State Claims Board. 13 claims were processed.

• 6,459 sworn reports were received.

76 hearings were scheduled.

6,022 licenses were revoked.

- Enabled Heavy Vehicle Use Tax documents to be submitted for online renewal of commercial vehicles.
- Consolidated the Motor Carrier Services server into the shared hardware managed by the OCIO.

The Division of Motor Carriers administers a variety of programs relating to the trucking industry by regulating compliance with the International Registration Plan (IRP), the International Fuel Tax Agreement (IFTA) and the Unified Carrier Registration System (UCR). These programs collect and distribute fees and taxes between member states and provinces.

Goals

• The division continues to focus on increased usage and enhanced services related to the online services functions available to motor carriers.

• Utilize Lean Six Sigma tools to review low value added business processes in both the audit and processing sections.




The division serves over 4,200 Nebraska-based trucking companies that register over nearly 120,000 vehicles.

Accomplishments


• Usage of online payment for both IRP registration fee payments and IFTA tax payments has steadily increased. A review of activity for the past 5 years (2012 – 2016) reflects that online IFTA tax payments have increased from 26.46% of the total tax payments to 44.61% - representing almost 18% of dollars collected on tax returns.

• IRP collections reflect a similar trend. Over the past five years, online IRP payments have increased from 22.32% in 2012 to 31.52% in 2016, representing almost 29% of dollars collected from Nebraska Motor Carriers.

EINANCIAL BESPONSIBILITY RIVISION

Goals

- Staff participated in a Kaizen Event for the purpose of improving the process of mailing crash insurance forms to insurance companies. It was determined to develop an electronic site where insurance companies could actually access forms instead of obtaining by mail. As a result of this event, a legislative bill has been proposed to eliminate this process in 2017.
- Daily "huddles" are held, focusing on customer phone calls and the amount of time a customer is on hold waiting for a representative. This is also a great time for staff and management to communicate any issues and celebrate successes.
- In October 2016 Nebraska implemented State to State (S2S) which is an electronic tool that 15 states are currently utilizing to determine whether a credential applicant already holds a credential in another state. This information is used to insure a person only has one active driver license and also aids in preventing fraudulent credentials being issued.



FR denies driving privileges via disgualification (CDL licenses). suspension or revocation of driver licenses to those who cannot or will not drive safely, and subsequently the reinstatement of the driver licenses. The FR division is the point of contact for issuance of employment drive and medical hardship permits, as well as ignition interlock permits. The division aids in the collection of traffic fines and child support order payments.

 Worked with Nebraska.gov to develop and complete a website to allow the private agencies that provide the driver improvement course certificates of completion, to forward notification electronically. The completion information is updated hourly, which eliminates the previous delay in processing reinstatements, caused by waiting for the certificates to arrive by mail.







Total Suspensions/Revocations

RRIVER LICENSING SERVICES

Summary

The Driver Licensing Services Division ensures persons who meet Nebraska's identification and licensing requirements are issued a permit, operator license or commercial driver license, and individuals who meet the identification requirements set forth in state statute are issued a State ID Card. It is our mission to have exceptional employees deliver accurate, secure, and innovative services.

Goals

- Reduce wait times at Driver Licensing Offices.
- Implement a Lobby Management and Drive Test Appointment System.
- Add the ability to renew and obtain a replacement Commercial Driver's License (CDL) online.
- Expand the use of electronic road test tablets to CDL third party examiners when administering CDL skills tests.
- Write a Request for Proposal and go out to bid for a new Driver Licensing System.

Accomplishments

- Staff processed 674,605 applicants in 97 driver licensing offices statewide. 77,346 individuals used the DMV online application to obtain new and replacement permits, licenses and state identification cards without visiting a driver licensing office.
- An online change of address application became available in June. From June December, 9,894 individuals used this online service.
- Electronic road test tablets were deployed to driver licensing examiners statewide to use when administering skills tests. Mangers are able to review tests, ensure proper routes are being followed (GPS capabilities) and tablets calculate the scores, reducing staff errors.
- State to State (S2S) was implemented. The S2S is a verification service for states to electronically check with other participating states to determine if an applicant holds a driver's license or identification card in another jurisdiction. This helps ensure a one-person, one-license concept with the driver history following the person from state to state.
- Compliance Officers audited 32 CDL Third Party Testers (companies) and observed 177 skills tests being administered by third party examiners (58 overtly and 119 covertly), 25 Driver Training Schools and 28 DMV approved Driver Safety Courses.
- The Training Unit trained 38 newly hired driver license examiners, as well as 4 temporaries.

The Department sent out 265,702 driver license renewal notices.

- Nine providers are certified by DMV to offer Motorcycle Safety Education Training, employing 90 certified instructors. A total of 1,816 applicants participated in motorcycle rider training courses. 1,520 individuals successfully completed the training.
- 803 applicants were re-examined to ensure they were capable of safely operating a motor vehicle. Of those applicants, 13% retained their license, and 87% had their license cancelled.

65,887 postcards were sent out to individuals who had moved, but not changed their address with the DMV. 17,775 (17%) individuals changed their address as a result of receiving the postcard.

SERVICES DIVISION

Goals

- Maintain the Nebraska Motor Vehicle Insurance Database.
- Manage the Electronic Lien and Title Program (ELT).
- Administer the state's license plate program including inventory control of 78 types of license plates; and, design, approval, and issuance of specialty license plates.
- Print and mail over 2.1 million registration renewal notices annually.
- Administer over 160,000 handicap parking permits.
- Review potential driver license matches as part of the driver license facial recognition process to determine if additional investigation is required prior to issuance of a driver license document.

Accomplishments

- VTR Modernization Final Report published by BerryDunn.
- Completed Phase II of Active Shooter Training for DMV employees.

Summary

DVR oversees multiple programs including statewide Vehicle Title and the Registration System (VTR), the associated online services, and the motor vehicle functions performed by the county treasurers. VTR is used by all 93 counties for issuance of titles and registrations and collection of the fees and taxes due for over 2.4 million motor vehicles. Over \$670 million was collected through VTR in 2016 which was distributed to over 1,200 local and state agencies.

DVR is responsible for oversight and access to the database which maintains the records of 1.4 million licensed drivers and state ID card holders.

The DVR Fraud Unit also performs investigative work relating to vehicle title and registration fraud, driver license fraud, and odometer fraud. Motor Vehicle Fraud Investigators are certified Nebraska Law Enforcement Officers commissioned as Deputy State Sheriffs.

- Approved approximately 24,000 new specialty plate applications; 92% requested via online.
- DVR Help Desk staff provided technology and business support for county officials and general public.
- Offered for purchase six new specialty plates including: Nebraska Corn Growers Association, Ducks Unlimited Inc., University of Nebraska Omaha, Greater Omaha Chamber of Commerce, Mountain Lion Conservation, and Breast Cancer Awareness.
- Implemented process for directing 1% of statewide motor vehicle tax collections to the Vehicle Title and Registration System Replacement and Maintenance Cash Fund.
- Arrested 41 individuals for motor vehicle related fraudulent activity.
- Ordered and managed inventory process for over 4 million license plates in preparation of 2017 statewide license plate reissuance.

Staff responded to 89,627 phone calls.
